December 12

Niseko Tokyu Resort Co. Ltd., a company that owns Niseko Mt. Resort Grand Hirafu ski slopes, has unveiled plans to build a fancy condominium next to the ski site. The new high-end accommodation will have apartments where 300 tourists can stay. The construction is scheduled to begin in July 2015 and to be completed by December 2016. For the first time in about 20 years, Niseko is to see such a new large accommodation, though many small and medium-sized ones have been opening up.

December 20

Japan's government and ruling party agreed to open up a new section of bullet train line between Hakodate and Sapporo in 2030, five years earlier than originally planned. The government and LDP said that they can see their way clear to secure a source of needed funding. Many believe that starting Hokkaido Shinkansen operation earlier will also help boost the economy in Hokkaido.

January 15

"The Blue Pond" in Biei illuminated by LED has attracted about 6,000 visitors from December 20 to January 12, which has exceeded expectations. Over 15,000 visitors are to visit by the end of February when the lighting will be over. Even though the pond freezes in winter, tourist can still enjoy the beautiful Blue Pond now thanks to the illumination.

January 15

A lottery stand in Asahikawa sold "The Year-End Jumbo Lottery" tickets, which grants 700 million yen to someone who bought the top winning ticket as well as the ones with numbers before and after the first prize. The stand is popularly known as the place to go, because countless winning tickets have been sold from the stand in the past. Even those from outside of Hokkaido come to buy tickets. The stand has sold 14 big prize tickets, which won more than 100 million yen for the last ten years.

January 15

20 restaurants, pubs, and ramen shops with menus in English, Chinese, and Korean started to display an "Omotenashi Seal." The hospitality seal has an image of the mascot of Asahikawa City, "Asappi," wearing a toque blanche. Each store with foreign language menus also displays a small seal showing a language in which the menus are written.

Valentine's Day By Kim LACEY

There is no doubt about it; Valentine's Day is one of America's most popular holidays. More than 62% of Americans celebrate by sending greeting cards and flowers, giving candy or other gifts, enjoying romantic dinners, or all three. But the history behind Valentine's Day turns out to be somewhat surprising.

For example, the roots of Valentine's Day go all the way back to an ancient Roman fertility festival held in mid-February called Lupercalia. Later, the Christian Church chose mid-February for St. Valentine's Day in order to Christianize the celebration.

But who was Saint Valentine? Not much is known about the holiday's namesake. First of all, there was more than just one Christian cleric



named Valentine. One of them was sentenced to death for performing marriage ceremonies in secret after Emperor Claudius II banned marriage for young Roman men, thinking single men made better soldiers. Pope Gelasius declared February 14 as a day for honoring the soft-hearted Valentine at the end of the 5th century.

It wasn't until the 1300s though, that the holiday became definitively associated with love and romance. Back then people believed that February 14th was also the beginning of birds' mating season. The first written Valentine greetings appeared in the 15th century. And by the 17th century, people in Great Britain had begun a tradition of exchanging Valentine's Day cards or letters.

Valentine's Day soon caught on in the U.S. as well. The first mass-produced holiday cards emerged in the 1840s, and Valentine's Day soon exploded into a major consumer holiday. Today, an estimated one billion Valentine cards are sent each year. (More than on any other holiday, except for Christmas.) More



than 35 million heart-shaped boxes of chocolate are sold, and more than 220 million roses are produced for the holiday in a typical year. All together, Americans spend almost 20 billion dollars on Valentine's Day, or an average of some \$130/person per year.

While the most popular gifts were candy and flowers, nearly 20% of Americans splurge on jewelry, spending as much as 4 billion dollars annually. And those who prefer the ultimate romantic gesture are definitely not alone. A recent survey revealed that as many as 6 million couples are likely to get engaged on February 14th, continuing a long and romantic history.

AIC: How long have you been in Asahikawa? What do you do here?

Sam: I arrived in Asahikawa at the beginning of August last year. I am an ALT in high schools in Asahikawa and the Kamikawa district.

AIC: What brought you to Japan?

Sam: I wanted a change of pace. I had finished university and decided to do an English teaching certificate and met lots of amazing people from all over the world and realized that it was possible to go anywhere. I decided on Japan because, for me, it was a huge challenge. I don't speak Japanese and the culture is quite different from England.

AIC: Where are you from? Could you describe your hometown for us?

Sam: I'm from a seaside town in the North East of England called Hartlepool. It has around 90,000 people and is quite an old town. It was first established in 600 A.D.. The area I am from is quite industrial. There are lots of factories, so it isn't the best place to visit as a tourist but it feels like home to me.

AIC: Wow, quite a historic town, it seems. By the way, what was your first impression of Hokkaido?

Sam: I loved it. Everyone is so friendly to me even though they don't know me and I can hardly speak any Japanese (although I do try!). Aside from the lovely people, I thought that Hokkaido was the most beautiful place I'd ever seen. The mountains are breathtaking and the cities are vibrant and modern.

AIC: Did you get to travel a little? Where did you enjoy the most so far?

I have been making an effort to see as much of Hokkaido as possible. I'll try to remember most

of the places I've been: Sapporo, Hakodate, Lake Shikotsu, Otaru, Wakkanai, Obihiro, Kitami, Nayoro, Mombetsu, Lake Akan, Sounkyo, Biei, and Furano. I have no favorite. I love everywhere I've been!

AIC: It gets quite cold and snowy in Asahikawa. Are you doing alright?

Sam:

Sam: Actually, I love winter, so I'm enjoying the snow and the cold very much.

AIC: Sam:

What are some ups and downs of your work as an ALT in Japan?

There are many more ups than downs. Some of the ups include working with the students. They work extremely hard and are the sweetest people I've ever met. Also, I can study Japanese and learn more about Japanese culture and life every day—I love it. The only hard thing about working here in Japan is that sometimes I find it hard to understand situations when they are in Japanese. I am finding these situations getting less and less frequent because I study hard and people are always willing to help when they do occur.



Glad you are doing great. What do you do in your free time here in Asahikawa?

I love to go rock climbing. There are two rock climbing gyms in Asahikawa (I'm very lucky) so I do that in all seasons. In summer, I could go rock climbing outdoors because Hokkaido has perfect conditions. In winter I have been going snowboarding —another upside living in Hokkaido.

AIC: What do you miss most about home and how do you get over sickness?

- Sam: I sometimes miss the food. It's not usually any particular kind of food. I think it's the familiarity I miss. If I'm given a plate of food in the UK, I usually know what it's made of but not in Japan! I'm definitely getting used to it though. As for homesickness, I actually never felt homesick. I felt at home in Asahikawa very quickly, so I feel very lucky.
- AIC: Just out of curiosity, what is your favorite Japanese word or phrase? Sam: Mmmm, I really like ときどき because of how it sounds but I think my favorite Japanese word for the meaning is がんばる. We use this a lot while climbing. It is a great motivating word.
- AIC: Is there any Japanese customs or practices that you just can't get used to? Sam: Hmm, I can't get used to saying お先に失礼しますwhen I leave work or somewhere like that. I don't know why. I think it's a good custom but it's hard for me to get used to.
- AIC: Do you mind sharing your plans in Japan before returning home?
- **Sam:** I want to continue to explore as much of Hokkaido as possible, including Asahikawa.
- AIC: Sounds like a good plan! Lastly, what would you like to do in the future?
 Sam: At the moment, my goal is to stay here. I'm really enjoying my time here and I think I'd like to make Hokkaido my home, at least for the next few years.
- AIC: Thank you for taking your time for this interview.
- Sam: You are welcome.
