November 22

A new "Le Guide Michelin Hokkaido Restaurants & Hotels" is scheduled to be published in the coming summer. The guide book will be updated for the first time since its first edition was published in 2012. Bernard Delmas, president of Michelin Japan, said that they have decided to revise the guide to cover the latest information on restaurants in Hokkaido because new places have opened, old ones have closed and some chefs quit after the old version was issued five years ago.

November 27

The definition of "neyuki" (continuous snow cover) is that snow cover lasts for over 30 days. Neyuki in Asahikawa was confirmed to have started on October 29th. It was two days earlier than the existing record. The earliest record of neyuki observed in Hokkaido since 1961 was October 31st in Kutchan near Otaru in 2002.

November 28

Asahikawa Commercial High School's Mercantile Research Club, despite only having two members, won the highest award in an all Japan high school commercial research contest in Miyazaki Prefecture on November 17th and 18th. The two high school girls from Asahikawa presented research on how to sell small wood crafts such as small sake cups in vending machines at a pilot shop in Tokyo. Their unprecedented idea was highly evaluated by judges.

December 3

The Asahikawa Public Bathhouse Association has started accepting foods for food banks at five 'sento' (public bathhouses) in cooperation with NPO Association: Pieces. The association and NPO expect that more and more people and organizations will take part in this goodwill activity at those five relief areas. The Japan Public Bathhouse Association in Tokyo says that this is a new activity for public bathhouse associations across Japan.

December 5

JR Hokkaido has put an end to a 95 year-long train operation on the section between Rumoi and Mashike after the last train left from Mashike Station at 8:10 pm. The last train for Fukagawa having about 300 passengers on board left Mashike 22 minutes behind schedule because the station was crowded with local residents and railroad fans who wanted to see the train off. It arrived at Fukagawa 40 minutes later than planned after the train hit a deer in the suburb of Rumoi. The railroad company had to spend 4,161 yen to yield a 100-yen revenue on that section.



Life in Hokkaido

"Akemasnite Omedetou Gozaimasu" By KITAMURA Tadao

Happy New Year to all of you!

I sincerely wish that all the people in the world have a happy year in 2017.

Nowadays the world is involved in so many difficulties; atrocities caused by extremists, international dissonance, refugee problems, imbalances in the national economy, political instabilities, epidemics, environmental disruption, natural disasters, and so on.

We, the Japanese people, since very olden times, tend to think or hope the New Year renews everything from the previous year into something better. For our perspective everything in the morning on the 1st of January is quite different from that of other mornings.

Akemashite (明けまして) means 'opened (the door of the New Year)'.

Omedetou (おめでとう) means 'very happy for all of us'.

Gozaimas (ございます) means 'really it is.' (a polite form).

People exchange these words each other on this special morning. You might think the Japanese are not very pious or devout, and I would agree. However, you might be surprised to see multitudes of people on New Year Days going to Shinto shrines or Buddhism temples all over this country. I am not very superstitious. But when I stand in front of a shrine on this special day, I feel a different emotion, a sign maybe; that the New Year might bring us something good.

January 1st was originally celebrated to welcome the gods of harvest who bring an abundance of natural riches to the people. People have personified the New Year's Day as the divine, "o-shogatsu-sama." And to welcome him, people, even if they are not majority today, prepare *kadomatsu* (gate pines) and *shimekazari* (sacred rope) on the door-ways of their houses. And *kagamimochi* (two pieces of round rice cake, one on top of the other) are displayed in the proper place in their homes.

On the morning of New Year's Day, the whole family gathers to celebrate the coming of the new year by sipping a special kind of sweet *sake* called *o-toso*, made with a special herb that is said to promote longevity. And they eat a special dish called *o-zoni*, which contains *mochi* (rice cakes) in a vegetable soup. Dishes that are prepared for the New Year's holidays are collectively called *o-sechi*.

In the twelve classic horary signs, 2017 is the year of *tori*, (Rooster/Hen). Even though there is no reasonable ground, it is said that this year is good for starting a business; presumably because a Rooster sees something new earliest in the morning.

AIC: Sri:

So Sri, where are you from?

I am from Jakarta, Indonesia. Jakarta is the capital city so it is a crowded city, lots of traffic jams in rush hour, many tall buildings and so on. It's really different from Asahikawa. Indonesia is located on the equator so it only has 2 seasons: dry (April to September) and rainy (October to March). The temperature is around 20-30 Celsius. In some places near mountains, the temperature can be as low as 16-18 Celsius. Indonesia is famously known for having the largest number of tribes in any country in the world and has many different cultures and heritages.

Actually I was bit worried before coming here how to survive the winter because I got many warnings from my colleagues that it is very cold during the winter in Hokkaido. When I was in London the temperature would get down as low as 4 Celsius but here it may reach minus 16 Celsius! I was trying to prepare myself the best as I could, including packaging many winter outfits and getting vaccinated for influenza before coming here. Anyway, this is an opportunity and new experience. Take it as an adventure.

AIC: Sri:

What brings you to Japan?

Well, Japan is quite popular in Indonesia so I used to watch anime and read manga in my childhood/ teenage years. I've been interested in Japan since a long time ago. In the 1990s Japanese drama series were also popular on Indonesia TV even though nowadays Korea is more popular with K-wave, K-pop and so on. I think the most interesting about Japan is how tradition meets technology. Even they live so modernly, they still practice their traditions and maintain their heritage. Their culture/customs also very clean, polite, and well arranged. We can learn many positive things from Japan life. I came to Japan for a 6 month fellowship program, some kind of research training project in Asahikawa Medical University/Hospital.

AIC:

Is it your first time? What about other places?

Sri:

It is not my first time, but it is the first time being away for as long as 6 months. In 2007 I came to Japan for a Seminar/Symposium in Kyoto. That time I also went to Nara and Tokyo. It was spring so I could see the *hanami* Sakura blooming Previously I went to London, UK and Cascais, Portugal for a short term seminar/course. 20 years ago I also went to Europe on vacation with family.

AIC:

Do you speak Japanese?

Sri:

Yes I speak Japanese but not so well. Just basic level and quite enough to survive here. I can read hiragana, katakana and some easy kanji. I like to learn languages. I have also studied English, French, and Arabic at school but I have forgotten almost all of my French now since the pronunciation and grammar are so difficult. The most interesting thing about Japanese language is that the pronunciations are the same as Indonesian languages.

AIC: Sri:

When did you get here? How is Asahikawa?

I came there on August 2016 and will go back in February 2017.

I like Asahikawa. It's a quiet city and not too crowded like Tokyo. The view is also beautiful in the many tourism spots such as the Biei blue pond, Furano and so on, even now in the winter when it is very cold. I was lucky that when I came in August I still could see the beautiful flowers garden at Biei, as well as the Ueno and Tomita farms. I like animals, especially cats, and Asahiyama zoo is quite famous and near here, so I like it very much. I never saw penguins before except just on TV, so when I saw them I got really excited. I intend to go there again this winter to see the penguin parade. I also saw a red panda, Japanese crane, and polar bear for the first time. It is said that we can also see some wild foxes around here, but I only saw one once when I was at Kaguraoka Park, but I couldn't see clearly because the fox was running so fast. Actually I am also interested in several cat islands in Japan, but there is nothing near Hokkaido, I just found a cat café near the station: quite an interesting place.

AIC: Sri:

Have you been able to experience anything cool/new since coming to Asahikawa?

I already experienced spring, summer and winter previously, but not autumn. So when I came here I experienced autumn for the first time watching the leaves became yellow and red. was no snow at that time.


AIC: What are your hobbies? Are you into winter sports? What about karaoke?

Winter Attractions Selected Wood Works II




Officially the Asahikawa Winter Festival starts in February but a number of Attractions will be available before then
