Akio HOSOKAWA, a 73-year-old money collector in Oketo near Kitami City, opens his "Money Museum" again on September 16 since its remodeling last June. He expanded his museum to 130 square meters. Clan notes that feudal lords in the Edo period issued, as well as military currencies that the Japanese Imperial Army circulated in occupied areas are displayed. The museum also has a reproduction of an exchange counter from the Edo period.

#### September 26

"Shime Parfait," a parfait that people have when wrapping up a night of bar-hopping, is becoming more and more popular among people in Sapporo. A 26-year-old female office worker said, "I always have parfait at the end of the day when going out for dinner and drinks" at a café.

The manager of the café said, "The number of customers ordering parfaits has doubled in the last ten years, and a majority of customers,

including men have parfaits after 9:00pm." It has been the custom for people in Hokkaido to have ramen or soba noodles when they wrap up a
night of bar-hopping.

#### October 8

The City of Fukagawa puts a piece of land on sale for just 980 yen as long as the person buying the land builds his or her house and registers their family as citizens in the city within one and half a years. The city intends to attract more people to Fukagawa to prevent depopulation by providing inexpensive land for housing. Fukagawa plans to sell nine pieces of land: two close to an expressway interchange, and seven next to JR Inou Station. Each piece of land is 330 square meters and is worth around one million yen in terms of evaluation in fixed property tax.

October 10

Minoru NAGAHARA, a founder of "CONDE HOUSE," a high-end furniture manufacturer in Asahikawa, has passed away. Mr. Nagahara made a contribution to a brand of "Asahikawa Furniture," known for its design as well as being made of quality wood from Hokkaido. He studied how to design and make furniture in his late 20's in Germany, set up the furniture manufacturer, and helped develop the furniture manufacturer.

#### October 11

A brown bear weighing about 400 kilograms was shot by two hunters in a corn field in Mombetsu City. One of the hunters said that bears in Hokkaido usually weigh less than 300 kilograms, so he had never seen such a surprisingly heavy bear. Professor Tsubota, specializing in wildlife study at Hokkaido University, explained that the bear gained such weight by eating a lot of nutritious corn in preparation for hibernation.

You might have been terrified by repeated news of natural disasters: floods, land-slides, tornados, ship-wrecks, and so on caused by typhoons or low air pressure. There are not nearly as many typhoons in November.

However, it is still an unfortunate month for most of people here in Asahikawa. Daytime becomes shorter and shorter by the day. Sunset comes as early as four o'clock in the beginning of November and three o'clock on the last day of the month.

Weather is never stable during this month. Many days are cloudy, rainy or snowy. You will first see snowfall around the middle of the month; before which you'll experience unpleasant sleet storms and nipping winds. You'll not find any more of those brilliant colors that you enjoyed during the past autumn. Those remaining are chrysanthemums, "The Last Rose of Summer;" you might recall an old Irish folk song by this name.

People are busy preparing for the coming of winter. They have to change the tires on their cars to those for winter use, which effectively prevent slipping on snowy or icy roads. They set up makeshift

devices in their gardens using thin bamboo poles, straw mats, and straw ropes for protecting their plants from the pressure of snow and cold wind. Actually these days, these devices are mostly made of chemical products instead of natural ones.

One day or night, a very strong wind will blow and take all the leaves out of all the trees. This is called *kogarashi*, or "nipping winter wind." After a windy night, husbands are found busy in their gardens or on roads nearby their houses sweeping and gathering scattered leaves.

However, there will be a few beautiful sunny days between gray-colored ones. This weather is called *koharu-biyori*, meaning "a little spring weather," you might call it an "Indian

summer." In the midst of such a fine day, it is nice to stroll through a park or the precinct of a shrine or temple. This will allow you to discover another quality of Japan.

I also recommend that you to take a stroll around *Hoppo-Yaso-en* (北方野草園), the Boreal Plant Garden in Arashiyama. The woods have become very light because all of the trees have forsaken their leaves, and make for a view where the mountains of Daisetsuzan and Tokachidake are so beautifully covered with fresh snow.

For winter-sport lovers, this month is when they are trembling with joy, wishing for fine powder snow. Every year, top class athletes in Nordic-skiing are setting up their training camps in the Asahidake spa area. You'll see them running so fast that they seem to be flying, Of course, in Asahidake, you also can enjoy skiing earlier than any other place in Japan for the winter-sports season.



#### NanoWriMo in Asahikawa By Stephanie KOMASHIN

I'm a half Japanese, half white Japanese American from Los Angeles who adjuncts teaching English at Hokkaido University of Education in Asahikawa, is a PhD candidate, and loves flying squirrels. I have a lot of hobbies, one of which is writing. I've enjoyed writing since I was about six years old, but I have to admit that I used to think writing was something you just do alone. Even in a school classroom, writing assignments were usually individual, each student working at it solitarily at individual desks or typing up papers at home.

NaNoWriMo, an NPO based in San Francisco, showed me that writing is a lot more fun as a social experience. Whether we're writing fiction, fanfiction, non-fiction, blog posts, academic papers, or whatnot, the local meet-up of aspiring and published writers in Asahikawa have a blast with NaNoWriMo activities.

So what do we do exactly? Our favorite thing is write-ins: gathering at the same place, at the same time, to write in good company. It might not initially sound more productive than writing on your own, but the sense of camaraderie and mutual encouragement has propelled many of us to write more and better than we used to. We enjoy doing word wars, which means writing quickly for a "sprint" of ten or fifteen minutes and then comparing who wrote the most words in that amount of time. Through the website, social media, and video chat, we've done word wars with NaNoWriMo people in other countries during our gatherings, which has expanded the intercultural aspect beyond our local community. Exchanging a swap package with a newfound friend in Canada was a highlight this year. We sent Japanese goodies (notes, illustrations, origami, tea, stickers, stationary, pens, map, knick-knacks) and she mailed us Canada-themed items that could be divvied up (stickers, candies, pencils) or shared (Mad Libs, puzzle).



NaNoWriMo is short for National Novel Writing Month. To be honest, the name is somewhat misleading at this point: 1) it's gone international, 2) you can write anything – not just novels, and 3) our group has a lot of fun so we aim for monthly Asahikawa gatherings year-round. The reason it's called that is that most people around the world who do NaNoWriMo challenge themselves to write 50,000 words – or 80,000 characters (*moji*) – of a novel in one month (November, April, and/or July).

Some of us do that, while others among us set personal word count goals, punch out first drafts of writing projects we need a motivation boost for, interact with people around the world through the online opportunities, enjoy company while editing, and receive encouragement from one another. Of course, this usually involves snacking and chatting. And prizes.

We do write-ins wherever group members are interested in meeting up around town (such as a community center, family restaurant, café, college campus, or members' homes). NaNoWriMo is for everybody of all ages, people can write in any language and any genre, and there's no need to show your work to anyone, though some members invite feedback from others. Since Asahikawa is centrally located, even people in other parts of Hokkaido can come in on a weekend to join us. We enjoy it so much that we do all manner of hanging out together besides writing (everything from karaoke to all-you-can-eat restaurants to board gaming to sleepovers to holiday parties where we share our cultures).



In 2013 and 2014, I got a chance to give workshops on how to use NaNoWriMo in the classroom at METS (Meeting of English Teachers in Sapporo) Jozankei All-English Seminar, which gathered instructors from all over Hokkaido including Asahikawa, and at MATE (Meeting Asahikawa Teachers of English). It's rewarding to see students enjoy writing for the first time, and to hear teachers say how they've made use of the free writers' resources and curriculum worksheets. But most of all, I enjoy sharing my hobby with people who find out that they enjoy it too.
