

#### Asteroid Ryugu is a Dark Place 4/25

An international research team that includes researchers at the Nayoro City Observatory "Kitasubaru" has been observing the asteroid "Ryugu," and announced that it has the highest level of polarization ever recorded for an asteroid. Objects that have a high level of polarization tend to have low light reflectance. The data reveals that Ryugu is indeed, a dark astronomical object.

### Travelers "Depart" for Hawaii at the Asahikawa Airport 4/25

The event, "Pretend Travel: Hawaii Edition," was held at the Asahikawa Airport, located in the town of Higashikagura. Participants of all ages were able to get a taste of what it would be like to fly to Hawaii, despite the pandemic. Participants went through customs, ate a Hawaii-themed in-flight meal of Loco Moco, and watched the sun set in Hawaii through a livestream.

#### ¥6,230,000 Contribution Keeps Shiokari Station in Operation 5/6

Thanks to the hometown taxation system and donations from people across Japan, the town of Wassamu, located in Kamikawa subprefecture, was able to secure \(\frac{4}{6},230,000\) in funds to cover the operating costs of the unmanned Shiokari Station on the JR Soya line. In addition to the many train lovers across Japan, fans of the author MIURA Ayako, who wrote the book "Shiokari Pass," also pitched in to save the station.

#### Akkeshi Whiskey Receives Gold Medals at American Whiskey Competition 5/8

Three whiskey products from the Akkeshi Distillery in the town of Akkeshi, located in Kushiro subprefecture, have received two double-gold (the top award) medals and a gold medal (the number #2 award) at the San Francisco World Spirits Competition 2021 in the United States. This is the second year in a row that the Akkeshi Distillery has received the competition's top award in the "Japanese Single Malt Whiskey" category.

#### Local Asahikawa Businesses Eligible to Receive Financial Relief 5/18

In the recent State of Emergency declaration, Asahikawa was designated as an area where additional coronavirus measures will be in effect. Local restaurants, etc. that either shut down or shorten their hours during this time will be able to apply for financial relief from the government after the state of emergency ends in June. In a press conference, Asahikawa Mayor NISHIKAWA Masahito stated that it could take up to a month for businesses that applied for funds to receive them. In Asahikawa, around 2,300 businesses are eligible to receive financial relief.

# Explore Asahikawa

## Fraleet Alley (ふらりーと)

The alley that brings back memories of the Showa period

This alley, located in Asahikawa's downtown area, prospered as a fish and vegetable market before WWII. After the war, it flourished as an entertainment district with several movie theaters. As time passed, the number of restaurants and izakaya (Japanese style pub) grew, turning the alley from a daytime entertainment spot into a nighttime one. Guests staying at nearby hotels and company employees getting off of work would often drop by to grab a drink and eat grilled chicken. Taking the alley's new atmosphere into account, the public voted on a name in 2004, and from that point on it was known as  $5 \cdot 7$  小路 ふらり一と (5-jo 7-chome Fraleet Alley). "ふらりと" means "casually," or "on a whim," referring to how people casually drop by the izakaya to grab a drink and some food.

Nowadays, this alley has 18 different establishments that include restaurants, izakaya, a fruit and vegetable shop, and a hair salon. The citizens of Asahikawa are fond of the alley's nostalgic feel, which is created by the various remnants of the Showa period. Take a trip back in time and discover the alley's unique atmosphere and local cuisine for yourself!





Although I included pictures of the alley during the day, night is when Fraleet comes alive. The glow of the many lanterns scattered throughout the alley combined with the old shop signs create an atmosphere that makes you feel like you walked into the past. Given that the rest of Asahikawa looks fairly modern, this alley is a real treat for those who like the aesthetic of the Showa Period. I have been lucky to visit several of the small shops in this alley, including the ramen shop (fish-base broth), which I highly recommend! When the coronavirus situation gets better, come to Fraleet Alley and grab a bite to eat!

## UENO Farm (上野ファーム)

UENO Farm is one of the many wonderful places in Asahikawa that come alive with the start of the spring season. From the name, you might think that this is just one of the many local farms. However, you won't find animals or fields of crops at this farm. Just what kind of place is this?

UENO Farm is home to a charming garden that is inspired by the gardens of England, yet maintains the essence of Hokkaido's natural beauty. The style of English gardens tend to be symmetrical or geometric in design, whereas Japanese gardens are inspired by nature, and tend not utilize techniques that would make the garden look overtly manmade. This garden aims to combine both of these traits through the use of symmetry in the design of the garden, while keeping many of the wild flowers found in Hokkaido and letting them grow in a way that is reminiscent of how you would find them in nature.

Many of the flowers in this garden bloom at different periods, so you know you will be able to see many colorful and vivid flowers no matter when you go (excluding the winter, of course). If you are a big fan of gardens and aim to go frequently, you will notice the subtle changes in scenery that occur both seasonally, and yearly. Most importantly, this garden is a place where you can come relax and breathe some fresh air. There are many themed areas, such as "The Gnome's Garden," where you can gaze upon beautiful trees, wild flowers, and a variety of herbs, and the "Mirror Border" (pictured below), where you can walk down a path with flowers mirrored on both sides.

In addition to the flowers, you will definitely want to drop by the Oka no Fumoto no Chiisana Naeya gift shop and the NAYA café! The gift shop has many miscellaneous flower-related items, snacks, and souvenirs that everyone will enjoy. If you are a gardener, you will find many useful tools, and you will also be able to buy flowers and seedlings to enhance your garden at home. The café is located in a rustic, repurposed barn, and offers a variety of sweets and light meals. Take advantage of the outdoor seating so that you can enjoy the scenery of the garden as you partake in your meal!

Having lived in a large city my whole life, this is my first time experiencing rural life. I love being surrounded by nature, farm fields, the vast sky above. Also the fact that there are distinct differences in the season here is a real treat. I love how friendly everyone in the town is. They really look out for me and I appreciate every interaction I have with the locals.

AIC: How do you like Japanese food? What are some of your favorites?

Queena:

I love Japanese food! It's really hard to pick a "favorite" because I enjoy so many varieties of Japanese food. But if I had to choose, I would pick udon or oyakodon. They are my Japanese "comfort foods." Makes me feel warm and cozy on the inside. Additionally, I also really enjoy trying out new teishoku. I love the restaurants that offer a twist on the classic teishoku or have a rotating daily menu. You never know what delicious sides you're going to get!

AIC: Queena: What are your favorites from back home? I come from a Chinese heritage so my favorite foods back home have go to be homestyle Chinese food. Especially boiled or steamed dumplings. My family used to hand wrap hundreds of them during New Years. It's one of my favorite childhood pastimes. Aside from Chinese food, I really love (and miss) foods with good cheese! Like gourmet macncheese, grilled cheese, mmm, cheese...

AIC: Queena: How long do you plan to be in Asahikawa?


