Hokkaido Radio Dives Deep Into Gender Issues, (10/22)

In an effort to boost gender equality and implement a quota system to allocate a fixed portion of legislative seats to women, members of a Hokkaido interest group have begun to broadcast a radio show devoted to gender issues at the FM Sankakuyama Radio Station in Sapporo. Called "Under the Spreading Q Tree" (76.2 FM), the program is done in a talk show style with guests from all kinds of backgrounds to discuss the current gender gap and improvement in legislation.

Voluntary Return of Licenses by Mail Now Possible, (10/28)

The Hokkaido Police have begun to allow the voluntary return of driver's licenses by mail in order to encourage more elderly people to do so. Those who wish to take advantage of this can call the nearest driver's license center to receive application documents upon identity verification by the police. Once the filled out documents and your license have been received by the center, you will receive a phone call from the police notifying you that your license has been voided.

Asahikawa Meisei High School Band Wins Grand Prize in Contest, (11/2)

On 10/30, the brass band club of Asahikawa Meisei High School made their debut at the Japan Wind Orchestra and Ensemble Competition in Chiba Prefecture and won the grand prize and MEXT Minister's Award. The competition features elementary, middle and high school bands from all over the country in 7 divisions. After preliminary judging took place at the end of September, Asahikawa Meisei was placed in Division B (36+ members), performing Antiphonale by Nelhybel.

Concrete Seen as Potential for Paving Hokkaido Roads, (11/8)

Develop agencies, municipalities and research facilities have all been looking into new construction methods adapted to the cold, snowy environment of Hokkaido. Concrete, with its long-lasting durability and less frequent need for repairs, is currently drawing attention as a substitute for the current popular asphalt. Although initial costs may be high in comparison, concrete could curb road maintenance fees in the long term. It can last 40-50 years without repair, in constrast to 10-13 years for asphalt.

Appearance of Saury Pike in Harbors Attracts Fishermen, (11/16)

Schools of saury pike have been seen gathering in the Abashiri Fishing Harbor since November, causing many to try for a catch. Along the shore of the Okhotsk Sea, other harbors have confirmed the appearance of the fish, making this a rare event for early winter. Though initially easy to catch, rough waves made the harbor's waters murky and difficult to sport the saury pike. Nemuro fishing boats operating in the Okhotsk Sea have hauled in around 1,000 tons outside of fishing grounds. Researchers speculate the temperature of the waters drew in the fish.

AIC: Please tell us about yourself and where you are from.

Amy: I am from Freeville, New York, USA. It is a very small town in upstate New York. Before coming to Japan, I was an infant teacher at a Montessori school. I have a dual bachelor's degree in Psychology and English literature from Albright College in Reading, Pennsylvania.

AIC: How did you first get interested in Japan?

Amy: My best friend in middle school and high school was obsessed with anime and manga growing up. She encouraged me to watch some anime with her and that kickstarted my interest in Japan and Japanese culture.

AIC: Is this your first time in Japan? How long have you been in Japan?

Amy: The first time I came to Japan was in 2019. I studied abroad with Temple University for three months in Tokyo. I attended the Temple University Japan campus and I had an internship at Yamato

Nishi High School in Kanagawa as an assistant English teacher. I enjoyed my internship so much

that I decided to come back to Japan through the JET program as an ALT. I arrived with the JET program towards the end of July 2022, and I have been living in Aibetsu for the past four months (and I will continue to until I end my contract in a year or two).

AIC: What brings you to Asahikawa in particular?

Amy: Asahikawa is the closest urban area to Aibetsu. All of the Aibetsu locals I have spoken to do a lot of their shopping in Asahikawa. I was greatly encouraged by them to visit Asahikawa to do my own shopping. Asahikawa also has many interesting restaurants, karaoke places, etc. that are a lot of fun to visit. Asahikawa Station is also a very convenient place for me to go in order to travel to different places in Hokkaido.

AIC: What kind of work do you do?

Amy: I am an assistant language teacher at an elementary school. I help students with pronunciation practice and I provide an english environment for students to be immersed in the English language.

AIC: What are your hobbies? What do you like to do in your free time?

Amy: I have many hobbies. I am an avid reader and I usually am reading many books in my free time. I also love art and crafts, and I often paint or make crafts such as bracelets and clay figures. When I am stressed, I usually teach myself new arts and crafts-related hobbies, such as knitting, sewing small stuffed animals, felting, crocheting, etc.

AIC: Do you have any favorite Japanese foods?

Amy: I absolutely love sushi, especially salmon sushi. I

also love yakiniku. I first tried yakiniku on a whim when I was in Tokyo, and I am so thankful I did because it was the best thing I had eaten at the time during my entire 3-month stay in 2019.

AIC: Any places you would recommend to others (restaurants, sight-seeing, etc.)?

Amy: One of the main places I have visited and have honestly enjoyed the most is Asahikawa Station. Not only is it very convenient to get to, but it also is attached to an Aeon mall as well as a tourism office. It is very close to many different stores and there is a wide variety of merchandise that can be purchased. There is direct transportation to all of the different tourist spots/places of interest. There is also a direct bus to Sapporo which is very convenient and a lot cheaper than I had expected it to be. In America, a trip similar to going to Sapporo would be at least 100 dollars, but it was less than 20 dollars for one way.

AIC: What have been your impressions of Asahikawa so far and how does it compare to your hometown?

Amy: I really like Asahikawa. It is a nice and walkable city with many things to do. I was surprised at how many shrines are present around the town (or is it a city?). Asahikawa seems to be a peaceful and interesting place to live. It is very different from my hometown. I come from a very small town (its actually considered a village) of only 500 people. I went to high school in a neighboring town, which is also a lot smaller than Asahikawa. Asahikawa has a very convenient public transportation system, unlike my home town.

AIC: Do you mind sharing any frustrations or challenges you have encountered thus far?

Amy: It is definitely very challenging to live in a country where I do not speak the language. I am very glad that the people I have interacted with are very kind and helpful as I struggle to understand what they say to me.

AIC: Do you have any goals or things you are looking forward to doing here?

Amy: My main goal while I live in japan is to learn Japanese and to become able to have full conversations in Japanese. I also want to visit as much of Japan as I can before I leave. I also really want to visit a cat cafe at some point, since I have cats back in the US, but I have not had a chance to interact with any animals since I arrived.
