January 3

The traffic death toll in Hokkaido for 2011 was under 200 for the first time in 62 years, and also 25 less than the previous year. Around 51% were 65 years old or over. The number of traffic accidents causing injury or death was 16,395, which was also 1,693 less than the previous year.

January 7

The number of New Year's greeting cards per capita sent out this year was 26. It is the third in line to the number of New Year's cards per capita, according to the Japan Post Service's Hokkaido branch. Tokyo Metropolitan area had the highest number of cards per person, with the Hokuriku region recording the second highest number.

January 14

Sara TAKANASHI, a 15-year-old girl from Kamikawa Junior High School, won a gold medal in the female ski jump
 contest in the 2012 Youth Winter Olympic Games held in Innsbruck, Austria. She had already won a silver medal in the
 World Cup Female Ski Jump in Hinterzalten, Germany. Female ski jumping has become an official sport for the 2014
 Winter Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia.

January 17

Over 30 food stalls carrying various local foods are going to open along the riverside adjacent to Asahibashi Bridge, as part of the 2012 Asahikawa Winter Festival in February. They will offer "Asahikawa Ramen," "Asahikawa Steamed Bun," "Asahikawa Yakisoba Noodles," "Ezo Shika venison kebabs," and "Hokkaido-style Fried Chicken," which was the most popular food item during the "Tabe Marche" food fair last September.

January 21

Yu Darvish, the former Hokkaido Nippon Ham Fighters pitcher, now with the Texas Rangers, held a press conference at the Rangers Ballpark in Arlington. He said he has no worries about his new life in the U.S. and looks forward to playing in a different environment. Darvish and the Rangers agreed to a \$60 million six-year contract. The Boston Red Sox signed a \$52 million six-year contract with Daisuke MATSUZAKA in 2006.

AIC: What do you do here in Asahikawa?

Shern Li: I'm an exchange student from Malaysia on the AFS Japan student exchange program. I'm attending Asahikawa Kita High School as a second year student.

AIC: Why did you decide to do your exchange program in Japan?

Shern Li: I'd been studying Japanese for four years before coming to Japan. However, the way I was thought Japanese and the way it's actually spoken here is somewhat different, so in order to perfect my accent and sound more natural I had to study it in Japan. I was also really interested in Japanese culture, and I wanted to experience it first hand.

AIC: Why did you choose to pick Asahikawa?

Shern Li: Well, I didn't have a choice, I was placed here. I'm actually very glad that I was placed in Asahikawa.

AIC: What were your first impressions of Asahikawa and Hokkaido?

Shern Li: It seemed like a really peaceful place, slow-paced and family oriented. People are quite close and everyone seems to know each other. So, I felt that there is a strong community feel to Asahikawa.

AIC: Do you live with a host family?

Shern Li: Yes. I've stayed with one host family during my stay here. I can say I've been very lucky in that respect as I get along very well with them and I've fit in perfectly. I have a sister back home in Malaysia, but here I live with only my host mum and dad. I actually have a host brother but he lives in a different place. They have two dogs, which is really different to my home in Malaysia as we don't keep dogs. Most of the time it's just my mum and me at home, which is great because we get to talk a lot about different things. We get along really well, in fact she's my best friend in Japan.

AIC: How do you spend your free time here?

Shern Li: Most of my time is spent at school. I also have after school activities. At present I'm a member of the school's Shorinji Kempo Karate club. On the weekends I like to go traveling with my school friends, other foreign exchange students, or my host family. I like hanging out with friends and I really enjoy meeting new people. I love traveling on the train, even if it's only to Furano or Biei. There's so much splendid scenery along the way. We don't really have winter in Malaysia, so the winter atmosphere here is something new to me. It's really beautiful.

AIC: Which places in Japan have you visited?

Shern Li: So far, Tokyo, Sapporo, Biei, Furano, and some other places close to Asahikawa. I really want to visit Otaru and Kyoto. But as I'm leaving Japan next week that would be kind of impossible. I've seen pictures of Otaru and it looks so interesting. I'd love to see the canals and the old town in real life. That's something that you can't see in Malaysia. However, I'm more than content with what I've seen in my time in Japan.

AIC: Can you describe your experience at Kita High School?

Sher Li: Well, there's always a good and a bad to every experience. However, it's difficult to describe my experience in Kita High School because the school is so good. Everyone is so friendly and they've helped me so much in so many ways. I really didn't expect such hospitality. Teachers would stop in the hallway to greet me and ask if everything's ok. I truly love my school and I'll never forget this wonderful experience.

AIC: Besides Karate, which other school-club activities were you involved in?

Shern Li: Before I joined Shorinji Kempo I tried out various different clubs. I joined *Sado* (traditional Japanese tea ceremony,) *Kado* (flower arranging,) *Kendo* ("Way of the Sword" a modern Japanese martial art which uses a bamboo sword instead of a *Katana*,) Badminton, Volleyball, and some others. In the end I've found Shorinji Kempo Karate the most interesting and suitable to me. It's my first time trying it, and when I get back to Malaysia I hope to be still able to practice some of the moves during my free time. I'm not sure if I can continue to seriously practice it, as I don't think there are any clubs in Malaysia.

AIC: Tell us a little about your hometown?

Shern Li: I'm from Kuala Lumpur, the capital of Malaysia and most populous city. The greater metropolitan area of Kuala Lumpur has a population of over 7 million. So, basically I'm a city girl. Malaysia is a multicultural country, and Kuala Lumpur is symbolic of that exciting diversity. The main ethnic groups are the indigenous Malays, the Chinese, and Indian. Malaysia is a unique blend of all these cultures living together. Unlike here in Asahikawa, the weather in Kuala Lumpur is hot all year long, but not unlike Asahikawa, the people are really friendly. One thing you must know about Kuala Lumpur, and Malaysia as a whole, is the sensational food. Some of my favourite dishes are *Char Kuey Teow* (a stirfried noodle dish,) *Nasi Lemak* (rice in banana leaves) and *Chee Cheong Fun* (steamed rice noodle roll). Malaysian food can be rather spicy, and I love spicy food. I also like to go mountain climbing and hiking; in fact there's a mountain right in the city where you can view the sunrise.

AIC: Which countries have you visited?

Shern Li: I've been to Australia, Thailand, China, Singapore, and Indonesia. They were all family holidays. I have to say that, other than Japan, I liked Australia the most.

AIC: What are your plans for the future?

Shern Li: I've already graduated from high school in Malaysia, so when I get back I'll be starting college. I'm planning to do a course called Cambridge A-levels, which is a one and a half year preparatory course to get into a modern language course in a college in the UK. After completing this course I would like to become a translator/interpreter for English and Japanese. This is my passion and I really want to achieve this dream. I would also like to get married and have children.

AIC: Well, thank you very much for your time, Shern Li.

Saint Valentine's Day in Japan **Bv SEO Avumi**

St. Valentine was a physician and a Christian pastor in Rome around the 3rd century. In those days the Roman emperor, Claudius Jr., forbade the soldiers from marrying, so that their morale wouldn't be affected by missing their this, the emperor executed him on February 14.

In 1936, the first advertisement for Valentine's Day in Japan was by Morozoff, a confectionery and cake company headquartered in Kobe. An American journalist friend of the owner introduced to him the Western custom of Valentine's Day. Although some Japanese department stores advertised the new custom, it didn't take off at the time.

The reemergence of Japanese Valentine's Day came in 1958. "Mary Chocolate Co., Ltd.," which was also a confectionery company, conducted a campaign in a department store called "Ladies, let's give a Valentine's Day chocolate to the gentlemen." This campaign was the origin of Japan's unique Valentine's Day chocolate giving by women to men. According to the Mary's, the reason "from women" was that women predominantly shop at department stores.

Also, in Japan around 1958, many women's magazines were launched under the influence of women's liberation movement in the U.S. There was an atmosphere of "Women should express their opinions more. Take the initiative in love." Thereafter, Chocolate & Cocoa Association of Japan established February 14 "Day of Chocolate," and therefore distribution business circles began to have chocolate sales campaigns in a big way.

St. Valentine's Day had become a ritual in Japan from the late 1970s to the present day. Even though 50 years have passed since the end of the war, can we really say that democracy has become firmly established in Japan?

More unique features of Japanese Valentine's Day are 'Giri Choco,' chocolates that are

given out as a social obligation on Valentine's Day; and 'White Day' on March 14, a day of giving a gift in return for a gift given on the Valentine's Day. Like a general introduction, Romania is located in the south-eastern part of Europe, bordering Black Sea. With an area of around 240,000 square kilometers, the population is about 21 million people.

He may have not been a vampire, he was just a Romanian ruler during the Middle Ages, who had the bad luck of becoming the bloodthirsty demon of modern times.

Talking about nature, Romania has a quite outstanding variety. The Carpathian Mountains are extremely beautiful, with breathtaking landscapes, traditional villages preserved since the medieval times and amazing mountain roads.


Transfagarasan Road was named by BBC Top Gear "The best road in the World." Also, if you are a nature lover, this is the perfect place to breathe the fresh air in one of our mountain resorts or to see brown bears in their natural environment.

A once in a while visit to a Spa is not only a recommendation, but nowadays it's a necessity. Take advantage of the natural

resources that Romania has to offer. Many spa resorts were developed near thermal springs, offering relaxation at very small costs compared to the normal western prices.

Also, the second largest delta in Europe and the best preserved is to be found in the southern part of





Romania, bordering the Black Sea. The Danube Delta is a 2,100 sq miles wildlife reserve, home to 160 kinds of fish and 300 species of birds. Dress accordingly, with waterproof clothes, a cap equipped with a water can, mosquito repellent, sun lotion and a first-aid kit, and you are ready to go. There are many places from where you can rent a boat for fishing or just observing the wonderful nature. From the 160 species of fish, the most common are pike, pike perch, carp and the cat fish, which is also the big-

The capital and the biggest city of Romania is Bucharest. It's a city for all the tastes, from crowded new shopping squares to old, delightful neighborhoods or quiet gardens. Right in the very center of Bucharest lies the Palace of Parliament, the second largest building in the world. You can admire it from the outside or you can also visit it.

If you don't like the life of the city, I can recommend you something even more unique. In the heart of Transylvania, surrounded by mountains, The "Bran" Castle, known as The Dracula Castle is the place of gathering





for thousands of tourists from all around the world every year. You can visit the castle and follow the steps Vlad "Dracula" took about 500 years ago.

Transylvania is not only known for this castle. The very beautiful cities in this area are perfect to visit anytime. One of them is the city of Sighisoara, a medieval fortress, perfectly preserved since hundreds of years ago. The fortress is among the most spectacular and mysterious medieval citadels in Transylvania and it is a true historic monument. Sighisoara is a true phenomenon of modern times, it seems to be insensitive to time and changes, keeping its quiet medieval town aura, refusing to accept the realities of the 21st century.

Another place you

should not miss is the north-eastern region of Moldova, Bucovina. Bucovina is famous for the big number of beautifully painted Orthodox monasteries. These painted monasteries are covered by so rare and well preserved frescos that they have been added to UNESCO World Heritage in 1993.

This area is not considered to have a high concentration of monasteries for nothing, right close to Bucovina is the mountainous region of Maramures, famous for the Wooden Churches which are unique in the world, because of the way they combine Gothic style and tradi-



tional wood construction. These are also part of UNESCO World Heritage. And if you think that just a couple of hours visit is not enough, many of the monasteries will be more than happy to offer you accommodation.



Also, if you are in Maramures, you can see the Romanians' way of dealing with death, the unique Merry Cemetery. It is a cemetery in the village of Săpânţa, Maramureş, it is famous for its colourful tombstones with Naïve-style paintings describing, in an original and poetic manner, the persons that are buried there as well as scenes from their lives.

Oh, and do not forget to try the delicious Romanian cuisine or our traditional alcoholic drink made out of plums, "Tuica."
