December 20

AIR DO, a Hokkaido-based airline, celebrated the 15th anniversary of its inaugural flight from New Chitose Airport to Haneda Airport (Tokyo.) The president and some airline staff members gave out cards and cookies to the passengers on flight No. 16 to Tokyo. AIR DO is a pioneer in budget carrier business in Japan, which had once been declared bankrupt but has returned to normal by support from ANA.

January 6

Hokkaido University Hospital announced that it had carried out heart transplant operations in Hokkaido for the first time in 45 years. In 1968, a team at Sapporo Medical University Hospital performed the first cardiac transplant operation in Japan. Some people filed a criminal complaint against a surgeon who played a leading role in the operation on suspicion of killing a donor and a recipient, although he was exempted from prosecution due to lack of evidence.

January 7

The City of Kushiro announced to have set up an organization that arranges an interpreter who will help foreign travelers see a doctor when they get hurt or sick. As of now, interpreters of eight different languages (English, Chinese, Russian, Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog, Malay and Indonesian) are available. In Kushiro City, the number of foreign visitors has been increasing rapidly, thanks to direct flights from Taiwan and frequent cruise ships from abroad.

January 8

A research team at Obihiro University of Agriculture and Veterinary Medicine developed a method to judge whether a puppy is likely to be qualified as a guide dog based on a gene analysis. Guide dogs need to be quiet and have great concentration and memory. The group of researchers has found the difference between SNP (single-nucleotide polymorphism) of dogs that pass the test for guide dogs and of those that don't.

January 10

Caroline Bouvier Kennedy, the U.S. Ambassador to Japan, had a ski vacation in the Niseko district with her family for the first time from January 6 to 8. The ambassador posted a picture of her skiing with a comment, "Loving Hokkaido powder." on her Twitter on the evening of the 8th. According to the U.S. Embassy, any details on her place of stay or schedule of the ski resort cannot be given, since this is her informal visit to Hokkaido.

Japan and the Olympics

Sochi 2014 Winter Olympics By Kim Lacey



The 22nd Olympic Winter Games will be held in Sochi, Russia from February 7-23. Japanese athletes have won countless medals, not only in Summer but also in Winter Games. The best rank for Japan in Winter Olympics was the 7th overall, which was attained in 1998 in Nagano. Can we expect a new record this year?

The 2014 Winter Olympics are taking place this month in Sochi, Russia. This Olympic Games hold a significant meaning to Russia because it will be the first Olympics in the Russian Federation since the collapse of the USSR. The longest torch relay in Olympic history began on September 29, 2013 in Ancient Olympia, initiating a 7-day journey across Greece and on to Russia. Then the torch relay resumed in Moscow on October 7, 2013 and is currently passing through 83 Russian cities. It will arrive at Sochi on the day of the opening ceremony.

Ninety-eight events in fifteen winter sports will be held overall. 136 athletes from Japan will be competing in all fifteen sports. Japan, along with South Korea and China, is one of the few nations in Asia that consistently rank in top 20 in Winter Olympic Games. At the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver, for instance, Japan earned five medals, including three silver and two bronze. Japanese ath-

letes showed exceptional strength in speed skating and figure skating. Also at the 2006 Winter Olympics in Turin, Italy, Japan finished with the 18th in overall rank, even though the country earned only one gold medal, won by Shizuka ARAKAWA in women's figure skating.

Naturally, the main attraction of this Olympic for Japanese people is most likely to be figure skating. Japan's former world figure skating champions and Olympic medalists, Daisuke TAKAHASHI and Mao ASADA are hopeful for medals this time. ASADA is a two-time (2008 and 2010) World Champion, and the 2010 Vancouver Olympics silver medalist. TAKAHASHI is notable as the 2010 Olympic bronze medalist and the 2010 World Champion.

Japan also has a great prospect for a medal in ski jump this time: Sara TAKANASHI. She is a rising star in women's ski jump, who has already won her eighth World Cup event of the season last month. TAKANASHI was actually born and grew up not too far from Asahikawa, in Kamikawa. The 17-year-old athlete might just bring a big surprise for Japan's Olympic team.

Interviewed: January 18th, 2014 by AIC

AIC: Could you tell us a little about yourself?

David:

Well, my name is David Alejandro Ossorio and I am an American student who just finished high school in Colombia, because my parents are originally from Colombia. After graduation, my dad said that since I've done really well in school, I should do whatever I want before going to college. I thought it would be nice to come back and visit my host family in Japan. So, I am visiting my host family at the moment and applying to universities. That's pretty much where I am right now.

AIC: I understand that you were in Asahikawa City two years ago as an exchange student. How was your life after Asahikawa?

David:

Hmm, after the exchange program in Asahikawa was over, I moved to Colombia and started two years of high school, the 11th and 12th grade. Like I already mentioned, I just recently graduated and will be in college a few months from now.

AIC: So, how does it feel to be back in Asahikawa? What did you miss the most about Japan when you were in Colombia?

David:

The thing I missed the most from Japan, I'd have to say, is karaoke. Karaoke is something that you just can't do in the States the same way. Besides that, I've missed my host family a lot. They are really sweet people. I also missed my friends, but I got to see a couple of them. Pretty much everyone has gone to their own ways after graduation here, so it is kind of hard to meet them. It feels awesome to be back, though. Things really haven't changed that much. There might be a couple of changes in the City, like a few new buildings, but it is nice to see that Asahikawa is the same cozy community that it was before.

AIC: From your experience, would you recommend studying abroad while still in high school? What were some ups and downs for you?

David:

Let's see... Being an exchange student, the language barrier in the beginning was very rough for me. Not being able to communicate the way you do back in your home country can be quite tough. Sometimes you cause misunderstandings but that is bound to come. Once you get over it and start being able to communicate, things become fine. I actually think that high school is a good time in your life when you are a young adult. Essentially, going on an exchange student program can have you grow up in a sense and take more responsibilities away from home. It allows you to see things in a different way in one country, and then go back to your home country and compare, you know.

AIC: Those are all excellent points. So is Asahikawa how you were expecting it to be in your head?

David: I was actually kind of hoping to come in a warmer season. Two years ago I left just around January and I came back in January again this time. But it's still very fine.

AIC: There are so many foreigners who have never heard of Asahikawa City or even of Hokkaido. How do you usually describe and share your experience to your friends and families back home?

David: Umm, back home, Hokkaido means nothing to them because when they think of Japan, they immediately associate it with more famous, bigger cities, like Tokyo and Nagoya. However, I describe Asahikawa as "a little town up north, very small and communal. A nice little neighborhood!" That is how Asahikawa is to me.

AIC: What were some good ways of not losing the language ability that you gained? Were there specific things that you did to keep up with your Japanese skills?

David: That is the thing, though. My Japanese was a lot better back then. But I tried as much as I could to communicate and Skype with my host mom, just keep thinking and talking in Japanese as much I could. Manga and anime also help you a lot. Essentially that way, I kind of made a practice of Skyping with my Japanese friends.

AIC: Definitely takes some dedication and time! Is there anything that you are looking forward to doing during this visit to Japan?

David: Anything that I am looking forward to doing? Hmm, I don't know. I am pretty much already doing it. Just being here is a blessing... Just being here is amazing. But if there is one thing, I just want to get my university stuff over with, especially here in Japan.

AIC: Do you mind sharing us your future plans? What do you want to study in college?

David: Alright, so I'm a little indecisive at the moment, trying to choose between America and Japan for my university. But essentially, I would like to follow my dad's footsteps and go through the business route. I want to learn more about financial management. Like father, like son!

AIC: (Laugh) Did you find the Japanese and American college application process to be much different from each other?

David: Different in a sense that Japan requires a couple more things here and there, because I am a foreigner, while in the States they don't ask for that much since I am just another ordinary American.

AIC: David, it was really nice talking to you today. Hope you enjoy the rest of your stay in Asahikawa!

David: No problem. Thanks for having me.
