July 31

The mayor of Yubari City presented the Qatar foreign minister with Yubari melons when the mayor visited Doha to express his gratitude to the State of Qatar on July 31. In 2012, Qatar helped the city of Yubari carry out a program, which invited the people in Tohoku region affected by the massive earthquake in 2011. The mayor also treated sheikhs to the melons at a Japanese restaurant there to extend a market for Yubari melons.

August 2

JR Hokkaido announced to close Tappi-Kaitei Station in the Seikan Tunnel which connects Hokkaido and Honshu (the main Japanese island) in early November. The tunnel is planned to go through a renovation in order to resume the operation of the Hokkaido Shinkansen line in fiscal 2015. The only undersea station in Japan opened in 1988 and is located 134 meters under the Tsugaru Strait.

August 6

Transport Police officials in Asahikawa Higashi Police Station handed out flyers to visitors from abroad at the Asahikawa Airport on August 6. The flyers explain traffic rules in Japan to avoid accidents, and are available in English, Chinese and Korean languages. A Korean tourist driving a rented car caused a fatal traffic accident in the town of Biei on August 3.

August 6

Lê Công Vinh, a goal getter of Vietnamese national soccer team, has joined Consadole Sapporo, a professional soccer team in Japan League Division 2, on a season-long loan deal on August 6. The soccer player has participated in 51 international matches and scored 35 international goals. At a press conference, he expressed his wishes to score as many goals as he can.

August 15

Thirteen college basketball teams in and out of Hokkaido are having a training camp in the city of Wakkanai this summer. On top of its cool climate, hospitalities provided by people in Wakkanai have attracted a growing number of college teams over the years. Another advantage of having a camp there is that it is one of the most convenient places for athletes to play practice matches against good teams.

Hometown: Austin, Texas, United States Interviewed: August 22nd, 2013 by AIC

AIC: Is this your first time to Japan?

Kim:

No, actually my first destination to Japan was Tokyo. I was there for about a month last summer, living in a sharehouse and traveling. I loved every minute of it. Because Tokyo is one of the biggest cities in the world, it was an excellent opportunity to meet and make friends from all over the world. Come to think of it, it was exactly a year from today when I left Japan. At that time, I had no clue that I will be returning to Japan so soon. It is my first time to Hokkaido, though and to be honest, I was not aware of Asahikawa's existence until the beginning of this year. Since my arrival, I've realized that there is more to Japan than Tokyo and Osaka, not to mention that there is so much more to Hokkaido than Sapporo City. It is a shame that not too many foreigners know this. Hopefully, I can make a small contribution to advertising and hosting more foreign tourists to many wonderful parts of Hokkaido. On a personal level, I feel very lucky that I am in Asahikawa City, at the very center of Hokkaido. I am looking forward to exploring Hokkaido during my stay here.

AIC: Where are you from? Were you born in the U.S.?

Kim:

I guess I have a pretty unique background. As some people might be wondering, I am not your typical American that many people here easily picture. I think all of my predecessors looked foreign and somewhat "different," but in my case, not too many people can tell that I am American unless I say so, or start speaking in English. I am Korean-American, if you will. I was born in South Korea but moved to Texas as a child. I've spent about two-thirds of my life in the U.S.. There are many people like me in America; African-Americans, Hispanic-Americans and Asian-Americans, to name a few. It is one of my wishes to broaden this kind of understanding here in Japan through both my job and private social interactions. Other things that confuse people often is my name. My last name is *Lacey*, not Kim, because my step-father is Irish-American. My friends back home call me *Kimmy* or *Kimberly*.

AIC: What brought you to Asahikawa?

Kim:

I became interested in Japanese culture and language during my sophomore year in college. Then around last year, I heard about this opportunity to work as a Coordinator for International Relations (CIR) in Japan and decided to apply to this position. Applicants can request a specific city or region when filling out the application, but I decided to leave it blank. Hey, I like surprises! A few months later I heard back that I will be placed to Asahikawa. Currently, I am working for the Asahikawa International Affairs Division. It has been only two weeks so I have a long way to go until I get used to both my position and life in Japan in general. My impression of the city so far is that Asahikawa is a great city, surrounded by nature and kind people..

AIC: What have you been doing since your arrival? Is there anything particular you would like to try in Japan?

Well, I met so many new people for work in relatively a short period of time. I am still trying to memorize people's names, going through a pile of business cards I've received during the last couple of weeks. I also tried the famous Asahikawa shoyu ramen and Jingiskan mutton meat at a beer garden with some colleagues. Unfortunately, I haven't had a chance to really explore the area because it's been raining every weekend. I would like to try some winter sports here, taking advantage of heavy snow. Also, as mentioned above, I hope to travel around as much as I can and get to know the northern parts of Japan.

AIC: What do you like to do in your free time?

> I love traveling, watching movies and studying foreign languages. Even before I got into Japanese language, I enjoyed watching Japanese anime, such as Pocket Monsters and Slam Dunk as a child. My immediate goal for now is to improve my Japanese (especially kanji) and learn more about Japan. I also like listening to music while walking/biking. Some of my favorite Japanese musicians are Mr. Children, GReeeeN, Funky Monkey Babys (they are gone!) My guilty pleasure is listening to the 48 groups, SKE and AKB, in particular. I am into sports as well, both playing and watching. I used to run cross-country and long distance for track&field in high school, and in college I participated in Ultimate Frisbee and fencing. I had a slight injury on my left knee a while ago so I am trying to take it easy. Perhaps I should start running again here before it gets too cold.

AIC: What is your ultimate goal in life?

> As far as my career is concerned, I see myself returning back to the U.S. after finishing my time here in Asahikawa, however many years that may be. I would like to become a foreign officer, working at the U.S. embassy or consulate abroad. I think the happiest and luckiest people in the world are those who have a job that they truly love and enjoy. In my case, I think this career path would suit me well since I love to travel and interact with various people from different culture and background. It will be even better if Japan will somehow be involved in my future life. Finally, I hope to find a person I deeply care about and spend the rest of my life with that special someone.

People are saying that recently climate on the earth has been changing rapidly because of carbon dioxide density in the atmosphere. Meteorological abnormality is occurring very frequently all over the world. Icebergs in the polar regions and glaciers in uplands are decreasing in their mass, and isle nations are losing their land areas.

In Hokkaido, too, we definitely can experience some changes of seasons. Number of *manatsubi* days, in which the high temperature exceeds 30 degrees Celsius, is increasing every summer. And during winter, heavy snow causes significant inconvenience in urban life.


And coming of autumn this year might take place later than the previous year. September 23rd is Autumnal Equinox Day. There surely remains remnant of summer in most part of this archipelago, even in September. Yet, here in Asahikawa, we surely feel air of autumn.

Have you ever heard Japanese idiomatic prose expressing pleasantness of autumn: the season when horses fatten under high and blue sky? Referring to this, an American writer (Jack Seward (2000), 'The McNeil of Tokyo.' Tuttle Publishing) puckishly puts forward a question through one of his characters; "Why the Japanese would prize obesity in their horses? Surely they did not eat them." Neither have I been sure why it is good when horses are fat. How do you think?

Anyway, September in Asahikawa is beautiful and nice. Tinted scenery of autumn is what people of Hokkaido are equally proud of. We think without hesitation that it is the best thing in the whole world. It is said that abundant solar energy with help of sharp change in air temperature in the mountains of Hokkaido causes biochemical reactions in plants so active that the color substances in their leaves become markedly prominent.

Mountain tinting begins on the hillsides of the Daisetsu Mountain Range around mid-September. You will be amazed to see brilliantly colored leaves of alpine plants, such as *JIMU-KADE*, *Harrimanella stelleriana*., *URASHIMA-TSUTSUJI*, *Arctous alpinus*, members of azalea family *and CHINGURUMA*, *Geum pentapetalum*, a member of rose family, contrasting greenness of creeping pine.

Later on, autumnal tinting comes down to villages, towns, and finally arrives at streets of Asahi-kawa around mid-October. Beautifully colored leaves of NANAKAMADO (*Sorbus commixta*)., or Mountain Ash will adorn streets or parks along with differently colored *Ginkgo biloba*, maples, cherries birches or poplars.

Hello Autumn

"Autumn Appetite" and Fruit Picking By: SAKURABA Satoshi

In Japan, it is said that autumn is better suited for various leisure activities because the temperature gradually drops to a comfortable range. We often say that "autumn is the best season for art" and "autumn is the season for sports." We may be dedicating ourselves to drawing, picture appreciation, some sort of sports and so on. On the other hand, some people say that autumn is a perfect season to have a good appetite (autumn appetite; 食欲の秋). In autumn, as you may know, there is an abundance of food from harvest, so we can enjoy eating delicious food, including chestnuts (くり;栗), Matsutake mushrooms (まったけ;松茸), saury (さんま;秋刀魚) and others.

Autumn is especially an ideal time for harvesting various seasonal fruit. One of the best ways to enjoy is by fruit picking (〈 だ もの 特り). There are plenty of farms and orchards in Hokkaido and some of them offer visitors to pick their own fruit. I think the most popular one may be apple picking. Admission fee for fruit picking varies among farms, but it would generally be around 1,000 yen.

The biggest advantage of fruit picking is the fact that you can enjoy fresh and sweet fruit. You can choose yourself and get the exact fruit you want, and also consult farmers on ripe fruit. Caring farmers might even be willing to share how to tell delicious fruit apart. The ones you eat at farms will be very sweet, definitely different from the fruit sold at supermarkets. You can even take some picked fruit home with you (but you have to pay extra) so that you can enjoy delicious fruit at home.

Because the fruit you can get by picking is scrumptious, you might end up consuming an extreme amount of food before you realize. Although autumn is the best season for eating, we should be careful not to eat too much.
