# Hokkaido News Top 5

January 2020 Compiled by AIC



#### Nov. 21

The Civil Engineering Research Institute for Cold Regions from the Public Works Research Institute announced that it will start posting information regarding visibility conditions during blizzards this winter season on its website. This service started in 2009 and covers 221 areas in Hokkaido.

#### Nov. 23

The Foundation for Ainu Culture hosted the 23rd Ainu Speech Contest (Itak=an ro!) in Chitose City. Thirty six people studying the Ainu language from all over Japan participated in the contest. In addition, a group of children performed a play titled "Firefly's Husband Hunting."

#### Nov. 25

A group from Kushiro City called the "Kushiro Nanmara Moriage Tai" won second place at the 11th B-1 Grand Prix food contest in Akashi City, Hyogo Prefecture. The group "Otaru Ankake Yaki Soba Shineitai" from Otaru won fourth place. A total of 55 groups competed in the 2-day contest.

#### Dec.1

Hokkaido has been a big producer of agricultural products for a long time. However, in the past 40 years, its presence has significantly increased. The acreage allocated for the production of root vegetables in mainland Japan, such as potatoes and Daikon, has decreased due to a shortage of farmers and the effects of global warming.

#### Dec. 16

Direct flights from Shin Chitose Airport to Helsinki Airport, and New Chitose Airport to Sidney Airport have launched. Flights between Europe and Hokkaido have not been in service for over 17 years, with 12 years for Australia. They are hoping to attract more tourists to Hokkaido for skiing.

# Life in Asahikawa

### THE NEW SPRING OF REIWA

I wish you a Happy New Year, and I hope the New Year, 2020, brings us a peaceful world with a clear atmosphere without contamination. This New Year is the first one named under Reiwa (令和), since Emperor Naruhito had acceded to the throne on May of this last year.

The era-name tradition must be strange for other nations, but people here put an exceptional amount of hope into the naming process. I happened to hear a foreigner give a remark in an interview while observing the parade of the new Emperor and Empress, describing the new era as 'BEAUTIFUL HARMONY'. I was very much impressed with his appropriate English translation for the word 'REIWA'.

A wise man explained that the word 'Reiwa' was composed of two Chinese characters adopted from the *Manyoushu*, the oldest collection of poems (8<sup>th</sup> C. A. D.). One poem in the anthology depicts the scene of a party held to celebrate the coming of the New Spring. OOTOMO-NO-TABITO, who seems to be one of compilers of the anthology, expresses his gratification for the New Spring:

Beautiful month of the first spring,
Atmosphere soothing and breeze softened.
Plum blossoms scatter their petals,
Like a beauty before a mirror strew her powder.
And an orchid Cymbidiun emits balmy fragrance,
As a noble man's clothes leaves behind

The entire anthology was written in Chinese characters, because in those days Japan had not yet developed its modern characters. In this prose, the Chinese characters,  $Rei\ (\ \ )$  and  $Wa\ (\ \ )$  mean 'beautiful or goodness' and 'softening or harmony' respectively. This prose was written as an introduction for thirty-two waka-poems, of which the theme was the plum blossom.

This party must have been held to praise excellent works of poetry as well as admire plum blossoms emitting their soothing fragrance into the chilly air of Early Spring. This poetry party is still held twelve-hundred years later and persists as a yearly tradition. Every year, as one of formal events of the New-Year, the Imperial Household holds the New Year Poetry Party; the scene of which is broadcast on television for the whole country.



# Winter Activities In Asahikawa

Now that winter is here, you can experience a whole new wave of activities that you can't do during the rest of the year. Skiing and snowboarding are the most widely known, but there is still so much more. Take a look!

#### Asahiyama Zoo in the Winter + Penguin Walk

Winter period: Now ~ 4/7 (Tuesday), Closed 1/1 (Wednesday) Hours: 10:30-15:30 (Last entry is at 3:00pm)

The famous penguin walk takes place every day of the winter season as long as there is a sufficient amount of snow on the ground. You can see the penguins take a stroll around the zoo every day at 11:00 and 14:30 (Penguin walks in March will take place only at 11:00). Emperor Penguins are prone to lack of exercise during the winter, so the idea of a "walk" was created with the goal of keeping them healthy. This activity mimics one of the Emperor Penguin's natural everyday activities where they make a walk to the ocean to catch fish. Penguins walk along a designated trail with zoo visitors lining the outsides to make a clear path. Of course, only the penguins that want to go on the walk will join it.



#### Asahikawa Machiakari Illumination

Date: Now ~ 3/8 (Sunday)

Location: Many areas throughout downtown, including the Kaimono Koen Shopping Street and Ryokudo 7-jo-dori

Illuminations have been installed on several streets in the downtown area to give light to this dark winter season. Each street has different illuminations with a different theme, so come take a stroll downtown and enjoy the lights! The two major illuminations are the Friendly Illumination on the Kaimono Koen Shopping Street, and the Ryokudo Illumination on Ryokudo 7-jo-dori near City Hall. The Friendly Illumination includes the picturesque light monument near the station, waves of lights mimicking the Milky Way, snowflakes hanging on trees, and more! The Ryokudo Illumination is best known for its three tunnels adorned with strings of lights that create a truly magical experience.

# Hello Asanikawa!

AIC: Where are you from?

Anthony: I'm from America. Specifically, Bloomington-Normal in Illinois. It's kind of a small city. No mountains anywhere. I love the mountains here, because the "mountains" we have in Illinois are really just hills. My city is close to Chicago—maybe an hour away. It's a

lot smaller than Asahikawa, and it's nowhere near as big as Chicago.

AIC: What brings you to Japan?

Anthony: It's kind of a strange story, but my mom came to Japan 20 years ago. When I was a kid, she introduced Japanese food and culture to me, so I learned how to use chopsticks as a child. She showed me Japan through her eyes and through her experiences so I thought, "Wow! That sounds so fun." Then I signed up and thought, "Hmm, do I

really want to do this?" Eventually I came, and I'm loving it so far.

AIC: I'm glad you're liking it here! How does living in Japan compare to the U.S.?

Anthony: It's very different. I'm even wearing a uniform right now. In America I can drive, and

It's very different. I'm even wearing a uniform right now. In America I can drive, and here I've gotten used to the crowded buses. I've also never really biked at home and it's fun doing that here. The life here in general is very different. I go out with friends here a lot more than I did in America, and I really like that. The only thing that I think is a downside is that it can feel lonely sometimes with the language barrier. That's defi-

nitely something to get used to, and it's hard to, but I think I've done a good job so far.

AIC: Best of luck! What are the big differences between Asahikawa and where you live?

Anthony: Probably the coldness. Other than that, the city

feels huge to me. It's about three times bigger than my city. Going from one side of the city to the other to get from my house to my school in the morning is so crazy and it's difficult to get

used to.

AIC: How long does it take you to get to school?

Anthony: I wake up at 6:30, I get on the bus at 7:00, and I

I wake up at 6:30, I get on the bus at 7:00, and I get to school at about 8:00. It's about an hour

long ride.

AIC: That's a long time!

Anthony: Especially when I was walking to school when I

was in America, so it feels really far. Other than that, the coldness and the length of winter are

some of the biggest differences.



AIC: Anthony:

How do you like staying with your host family? I'm really enjoying it. I'm living with the grandparents, and they have grandchildren that come over every day. I've gotten really close with my host brother, and somewhat close with my host sister. I really want to go to karaoke with them sometime. My host parents are both 81 years old, so we don't do that many activities together, but we watch T.V. and we talk about our experiences. For some reason, they're really interested in Spanish, so I teach them some Spanish sometimes, and that's fun.



AIC: Anthony:

What do you like about Asahikawa? What are some of your favorite spots here? Before I got here I had never done Karaoke and now it's my favorite thing to do. I'm actually planning on going to karaoke tonight with friends. In general, I like going to the AEON Mall. It's a big hub for all my friends, and it is fun just being there. Those are some of the things I like about Asahikawa and the big city. I've never lived in a big city like this before. It feels really nice, but also very hectic. I love seeing the tall buildings. I have a few in my city, but seeing them while walking down Kaimono Koen is nice.

AIC: Anthony:

Do you like Japanese food? If you do, what are some of your favorites? I love Japanese food. I love ramen and oden. In America, my mom made Japanese food every once in a while, and oden was my favorite. There's an Asian mall in Chicago and you can buy packs of oden. I can tell one thing for sure. Since I've gotten here, I've definitely gained weight. It's not going to stop anytime soon (laughs).

AIC: Anthony:

What are your hobbies?

Every once in a while after school I like to go to art class, and sometimes I go to tennis because I have some good friends in tennis club, although I'm not very good at it. My favorite is volleyball. I'm not very good at it because I never did it in America, but I really enjoy it here. I'm learning a lot through the class, and I'm making good friends with lower grade students, so I'm happy about that. Outside of school, I would say that hanging out with friends is the thing I do the most. On days I can't, I'm usually home with my host parents and siblings, and sometimes I spend time studying Japanese.

AIC: Anthony: What languages do you speak? How is your Japanese studying coming along? I can speak three languages... somewhat. I can speak Spanish and English fluently, and my Japanese is getting there. I wouldn't say fluently, but I'm working on it. Ever since I've gotten here, I've noticed that my Japanese has been really getting better. I don't want to judge myself on saying that I sound native, but there are some things that you hear native speakers say, and you start to sound more native after listening and practicing. I feel like that has really happened with me for Japanese.



AIC:

Good listening skills are definitely important. Best of luck! How long do you plan to be in Asahikawa?

Anthony:

My entire foreign student exchange stay is ten months. I'll be leaving in June. I've been here for about four months, and so far it has been great, and I don't think that will stop at all. I think the rest of my stay here will be just as great.

I can sing one Japanese song, Marigold, and it took me a while to learn it. The students like it, and I like it too, so I thought it would be good to learn.

AIC: That's all I have. Thank you for participating!
