March 26

The Hokkaido Nippon Ham Fighters have announced that they will build a new stadium in Kitahiroshima by 2023, making the move from their current base, "Sapporo Dome," official. The Fighters' plan to develop their own ballpark aims to draw in a larger number of spectators.

March 29

The "Long-term Care Insurance System," an insurance system for persons of 65 years of age or older, has revised its premiums for the first time in 3 years, resulting in an increase of 482 yen (9.2%) all around Hokkaido. Increases are mainly due to rise in the number of policyholders. In Asahikawa and Hakodate, the cost of premiums reached over 6,000 yen for the first time.

April 2

Public elementary and junior high schools in Asahikawa, Kitami, Kushiro, Otaru and Sapporo will raise their school lunch fees starting April this year due to a sharp increase in the price of rice, seafood and more. Monthly lunch fees in Sapporo for example will increase by 350 yen for elementary schools and by 300 yen for junior high schools.



ASAHIKAWA Info Life in Hokkaido

KOINOBORI, Carp Streamer By Tadao KITAMURA

In the beautiful cobalt-colored sky, you might see several huge fish swimming cheerfully and vividly. People say that the large black one is Father, the smaller red one is Mother, and the little ones are the children. They swim energetically, gulping down the fresh spring air. These carp symbolize vitality, and the people absolutely love them.

Seeing KOINOBORI (Carp streamer) swim through the sky raises the spirits of the people more so than even our national flag. They are hoisted to celebrate a holiday, Children's Day, the Fifth of May; a day to celebrate and pray for the health and happiness of children.

Children's Day used to be called *tango no sekku*, a day of celebration for boys. Even nowadays, parents hope that their boys will become strong, lively and disciplined like the *samurai* of the past. Inside of their houses they display elaborate miniature replicas including a suit of armor (*yoroi*), helmet (*kabuto*), and sword (*tachi*); all of which are symbols of the *samurai* spirit.

It is also common to put Iris flowers beside the display for decoration. The word for iris in Japanese, *shobu*, has the same pronunciation as another word that means 'to compete in a contest'. In addition, the sharpness of its sword-like leaves resemble the weapon of a *samurai*. These are some of the reasons why iris flowers are added to the display along with the *samurai* armor. *Tango no sekku* is also called "Iris Festival", as the month of May overlaps with the flowering season of the iris. Iris has a soothing kind of fragrance, similar to that of camphor. Some people will also put iris leaves into the bath to enjoy the fragrance on *tango no sekku*.



Special sweets, *kashiwamochi* and *chimaki*, are also enjoyed on *Tango no sekku*. They are both different varieties of rice cakes; the former contains a bean jam filling and is wrapped in an oak leaf while the latter is a sweetened rice-dumpling wrapped in bamboo leaves and bound with a cord made from plant fiber. Both are put into the display along with the armor set. This could be thought of as an offering to the god of victory. Afterwards, the rice cakes are served for the family to enjoy.

The variety of iris referred to in this essay is not the European iris, but the Japanese species, *Hanashobu*. It is not as grand as the former but it maintains exceptional grace with its large, deep-violet flower. With its soothing fragrance, and possibly because of its sword-like leaves, people used to think that the iris had special powers to protect against epidemics and other misfortunes. People during this time (about 1000 years in the past) would, on a particular auspicious day before the beginning of the rainy season, put several bunches of iris leaves on the eaves of their straw thatched house to ward away evil. This is the origin of *tango no sekku*, or what is now known as Children's Day.



In this edition we interviewed Mr. Koshikizawa, the founder of the international exchange group "English Study Hokkaido." Inspired by his experiences as a part of an international exchange community abroad, Mr. Koshikizawa aims to create a similar community in Asahikawa where Japanese locals, foreign residents and tourists come together and have a good time! > AIC: Can you give us an introduction to English Study Hokkaido?

English Study Hokkaido

Koshikizawa: English Study Hokkaido is a community centered on international exchange in Asahikawa. Our goal is to provide an environment where foreign travelers, foreign residents, and local Japanese people can experience what Asahikawa has to offer and make good memories together. We offer foreign participants a place to communicate with locals, the chance to make new friends, and the opportunity to experience Japanese culture as well as different events and activities in Asahikawa. We offer our Japanese participants a place to communicate with and meet new people, the opportunity to speak and improve English skills, and the chance to make new friends.

AIC: What got you interested in English and international exchange?

Koshikizawa: 2 years ago I participated in an Australian "Meetup" community in Sydney, Australia. People of many different nationalities gathered together and we would have fun talking and eating with each other. During this time I realized that I wanted to organize an international exchange community when I returned to Japan.

AIC: So I'm guessing you were working in Australia, correct?

Koshikizawa: Yes, I've worked in Australia and a few other countries. I've traveled about 50,800km on overseas trips, so that would be almost 1.5 laps around the earth! I manage a company that deals in camping and barbeque products. We promote barbeque,

advertising Japanese green tea, and buy ingredients for ramen in various countries including Australia.

AIC: How did you enjoy life abroad? Koshikizawa: Living abroad had a big impact on my values and on my lifestyle, and all of it started with English. By being able to speak English, I was able to interact with people from many countries and I was able to travel around the world. What I'm trying to say is, if I could only speak Japanese I wouldn't be living such an active life.



AIC: Was there anything that surprised you about **Australian Culture?**

Koshikizawa: I was surprised that Australia was such an international country with people of all races and ethnicities. I was also shocked at the difference between Japan and Australia's work culture and the price of goods.

AIC: Do you have a favorite Australian food? Koshikizawa: Yes, my favorite is Aussie BBQ. You can't go

wrong with BBQ!



AIC: What are your goals for English Study Hokkaido?

AIC:

Koshikizawa: That's a very good question. First, I would like to state that what we are trying to make here is a community, not a business. People all over the world are using English to communicate, and it is our duty to help and prepare people here for that. In line with this, we have a few goals in mind. One is to share the wonders of Hokkaido with the world through the members our community. Another goal we have is to maintain a diverse pool of community members from all over the world.

AIC: What brings you to Japan?

Kendall: This time, I came to Japan to work for an Eikaiwa called METS. The first time I came was for a homestay program in high school.

AIC: Where are you from originally?

Kendall: I am originally from Cornwall, Ontario, Canada. It's about 100 km away from Ottawa.

AIC: How does living here compare to living in Canada?

Kendall: Canada and Japan are very easy countries to live in, because living standards are high, the crime rate is low and the people are friendly.

There are a few differences that I have noticed, for example, garbage sorting is much more complicated in Japan than it is in Canada. In Canada, we throw out a lot of garbage without separating it and then expect it to be picked up for free. In Japan, people use cash to buy things all the time, you almost never see someone

In Japan, people use cash to buy things all the time, you almost never see someone pay without cash.

When you want to have a party or hang-out, people in Japan usually go to a restaurant or bar. Canadians are more likely to just invite their friends over to their house. I never go to other people's houses in Asahikawa.

Lastly, living in Japan, you get used to seeing only Japanese people, but Canada is completely different. When I visit home, I always have the same initial shock from seeing the multicultural society.

AIC: Is there something that you particularly like about Asahikawa or Japan in General?

Kendall: My favourite thing about Asahikawa is probably the nature. I like being close to the mountains, I like all the snow, I like the cold (and hate the heat), I especially like the river bank because it's great for running.

Food is great, I love all the Hokkaido specialties like Genghis Khan, Ramen and dairy products. Generally in Japan, I feel that there is a strong sense of community and social cohesion. It doesn't take long for people to accept you and once you earn their trust, they are generous, hospitable and accommodating.



AIC: What are your hobbies? Do you do any winter sports?

Kendall: My main hobby is running marathons, but I enjoy anything that involves moving around or exercise. I also like driving and travelling, going to new places is always exciting for me. I do winter sports as well, I can snowboard, ski and ice skate. Also, I continue to run outside throughout the winter. Snowboarding is my favourite, though. I'm always ready to try something new, so I never turn down invitations.
